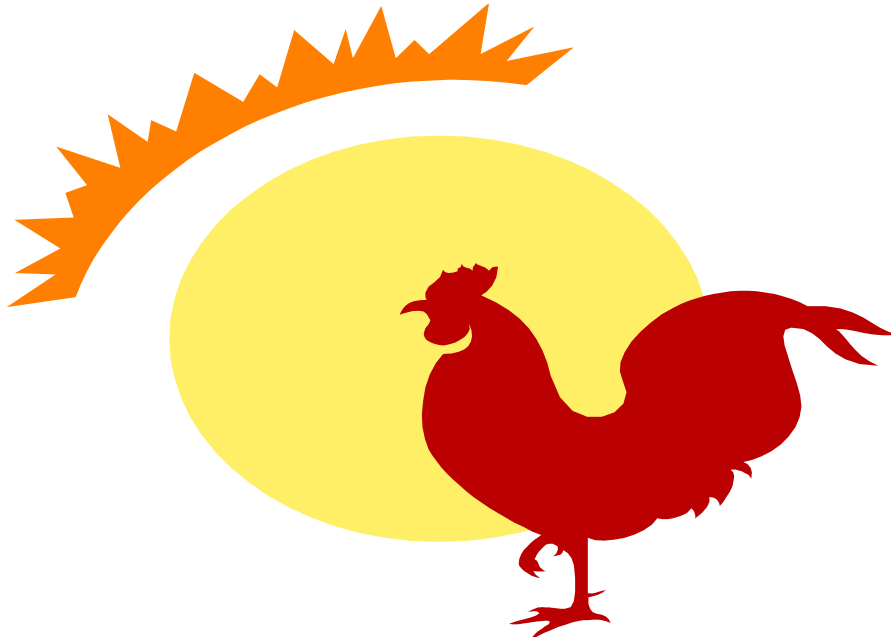

General Record Book Guidelines

1. It is suggested that a copy of the record book be made for the use as a “work copy.” Records can then be transferred into a “final copy”.
2. Your record book should start as of September 1, of the current calendar year, or when the animal was purchased, if after September 1.
3. Record books can be completed only on animals being shown or can reflect all animals owned with a note identifying animals being shown.
4. Always double check your work, especially the math calculations.
5. Have someone proofread your project story before you write the final copy.
6. Your final record book should be handwritten by the exhibitor. The only exception is that the story MAY be typed or handwritten.

Notes for Project Inventory (Page 4)

1. **Date acquired-** List the date you obtained this item, on items older than 1 year, the year will be sufficient.
2. **Purchased cost or value-** What did this item cost when you obtained it? If acquired used, give a fair market value.
3. **Value at beginning of project-** Same as purchase cost for items purchased the current project year. On items from previous project years this should be the value from last project year’s ending inventory.
4. **Depreciation of 10% per project year -** This will be 10%, per project year, of the original purchase cost for the items you will still have at the end of the project. This includes items you had at the beginning of the project as well as items purchased during the current calendar year. Depreciation is the loss in value of your assets and is an expense.
5. **Value at end of project-** This is the value at the beginning of the project minus the depreciation.
